Bird Watching Etiquette and Tips

Binoculars

It really helps to have your own pair. While you can share, it will be much more fulfilling if each person has their own pair of binoculars.

Field Guide and Notebook

A field guide will be filled with all sorts of information about different types of birds and it will have information about identifying birds. Your notebook will let you keep track of the birds you see.

Hat

It is important to remember a hat! A hat will keep the sun out of your eyes so that you can see the birds! Any type of hat will work.

Quiet!

Birds have great hearing, staying as quiet as possible will help you keep from scaring the birds away.

Private Property and Peeping Toms

Be sure to stay off private property. Some bird sanctuaries are on privately owned land and the owners do not want visitors. Also be sure to keep your binoculars focused on the birds, not other people's homes.

Be Respectful

Of the birds and of other bird watchers. Be mindful that you are in the birds' territories.
